PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Easter People:



On March 31st, we celebrated Resurrection Sunday. What a grand and glorious day that was. But Easter doesn't end on March 31st. The Easter season continues through the month of April and ends with the Ascension of Jesus on May 12th. There is a lot of time to celebrate and give thanks for our salvation and the gift of eternal life. It is beyond comprehension that Jesus died in our place. He took upon himself the Father's wrath, the sins of all of us. Jesus laid down his life voluntarily. By faith in Christ we have life forevermore.

But what if this good news of God's redeeming love never happened? Without Easter, Good Friday would just be another Friday. It is Jesus's resurrection that secures our resurrection. Today we call Good Friday good because of Mary Magdalene's announcement to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord." Without Mary's announcement, Friday and Sunday wouldn't mean anything.

There would be no gospel for me to preach. There would be no good news to share. There would be no reason to believe in a dead Savior. A dead Jesus wouldn't have redeemed any of us. If we deny the resurrection then Mary was a liar. Jesus himself would have been the top liar for he said, "I am the resurrection and the life." If Jesus isn't the resurrection and the life, then there would be no need for us to do mission work or share from our hearts. People who think we are already wasting our time, energy and money would be right. Christianity would be a myth. We would be enslaved to sin with no hope of redemption.

Praise God, that is not the end of the story! We serve a risen Savior. A Messiah who could not be kept on a cross or in a tomb. Since Jesus has come out of the grave, death is swallowed in victory! "He is not here; he has risen, just as he said." (Matthew 28:6). We can't have Good Friday without Easter Sunday and we can't have Easter Sunday without Good Friday. Alleluia! Christ is risen! "Ev'ry morning is Easter morning from now on. Ev'ry day's resurrection day. The past is over and done. Good-bye guilt, goodbye fear. Good riddance. Hello Lord hello sun. I am one of the Easter people. God's in charge spread the word. Yesterday I was bored and lonely. But today look and see. I belong to the Easter people. Life's exciting to me. COMMUNION- Beginning on April 7th, we will serve communion in the pews. This is that method of serving communion with the cubes of bread and the small juice cups. You will remain in the pews; the communion servers will first pass the bread throughout the sanctuary. Additionally, we will have a communion server with Gluten Free Bread and Juice. WEDNESDAY EVENING BIBLE STUDY/LUNCH BUNCH- For the Months of April and May we will be studying two books of the Bible: Malachi and James. The author of Malachi is Malachi which means, "Messenger." Although the Jews had been allowed to return from exile and rebuild the

temple, several discouraging factors brought about general religious apathy. The glorious future announced by the prophets had not yet been realized. The people began to doubt God's covenant love and no longer trusted his justice. The Jews as a community began to lose hope. Because of their hopelessness, the Jews rarely worshiped and they didn't take the law seriously. In response to this, Malachi encourages covenant faithfulness and obedience to the teachings of the law. Only through repentance and reform will the people of the Lord once again experience the Lord's blessings. Malachi tells the people to be faithful to the law of Moses. The day is coming when all the prophets' words will be fulfilled. Be faithful in giving, be faithful in service, the day of the Lord is coming! The author of James is James. He is most likely the brother of Jesus and the leader of the Jerusalem Council. James is one of several brothers of Jesus and is probably the oldest. At first he wasn't sure about his brother, Jesus. James often challenged and misunderstood Jesus, but later he became a very important leader in the life of the Church. Paul called him a pillar in the church in Galatians 2:9. He was martyred in A.D. 62. The emphasis of this book is on transformational Christianity. The book describes good deeds and a genuine faith that is accompanied by a consistent life-style. The book reminds us to be aware of pride, slander, boasting and a guarrelsome attitude. It also teaches patience in suffering. 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WHAT IS THE GENERAL CONFERENCE?- The General Conference is the highest legislative body of the United Methodist Church. General Conference holds the power to revise The Book of Discipline and the Book of Resolutions while also initiating amendments to the denomination's constitution. General Conference

usually meets every 4 years. Any congregation, conference, organization or individual may submit a petition to General Conference to change the Book of Disciple or the Book of Resolutions. Further petitions may also be introduced from the floor by delegates. There is a lot more that could be said about the workings of General Conference, but this gives you a short overview.

When is the General Conference and Where is it? General Conference is scheduled for April 23-May 3 at the Convention Center in Charlotte, NC.
